Between 1869 and 1909, Harvard's president was Charles William Eliot. He changed Harvard and made it the first modern American university with elective courses, small classes, and entrance examinations for all students

Today, Harvard has about 2,300 professors, 6,650 undergraduate students, 10,700 in professional programs, and 3,700 in graduate programs. It is more difficult to get into Harvard than any other university in the United States. In 2012, the school accepted only 5.9 percent of the people who wanted to go there.

Harvard's library is made up of about 90 separate library buildings. With over 15 million books, Harvard's library is the largest academic library in the United States. A huge library is useful because extensive reading is how you can greatly increase your vocabulary and improve your writing skills. A massive amount of reading is an essential part of a Harvard education. Being a highly skilled reader is the key to becoming successful in the Information Age. Seventy-five Noble Prize winners are affiliated with Harvard. Since 1974, 19 Noble Prize winners and 15 winners of the American Pulitzer Prize have served on the Harvard faculty. Some of Harvard's most famous graduates include Presidents George W. Bush, and Barack Obama, as well as poet T.S. Eliot.
